woOd



conceived and devised by Simon Gleave, Korina Kokkali and the Company

woOd began with the question: what if we take wood as material and a space for story and looked at it through the lens of transformation? What can the woods teach us about who we are?

We went to the woods - of our pasts, of myth and of Epping Forest - to study, embody and imagine how its stories reflect our own. These images and scenarios emerged between the performers in improvisation: a passage of episodes that explore innocence, fear and transformation.

We sought out people who have found refuge in the woods, while reading the myths, stories and fairytales that affected transformations. We began examining the breakdown of such stories and the refracted and broken cycles of communication that reflect our contemporary world. In an attempt to respond to a time of nonsense and narrative breakdown we return to the childish basics of theatre: fairytale, mask, dance, song and chorus.

What continues to emerge is a broken land of wood, creature and human in which gestures of refuge, care, illness and violence merge in a dance of death that plays us back the fragments of the wood. The wood, then, becomes our increasingly toxic, magic and violent time, asking us what it means to be wholly human while a part of nature.



Biographies

Simon Gleave Co-creator

Simon is a director, performer and teacher. He has directed work for Soho Theatre (*Paper Swans*), The Pleasance (*Unforgettable Girl*); as well as Rose Bruford and Drama Studio.

He is Co-Artistic Director of <u>JEUDi</u>, who make dance-theatre and perform ongoing research into how applied creative practice can support carers for people with Dementia or Parkinson's.

He is an Associate Director with Flabbergast Theatre with whom he has built and performed in the internationally acclaimed productions of *Macbeth* (****The Telegraph) as Macbeth, *A Midsummer Night's Dream* as Bottom and recently as Mercutio in *Romeo and Juliet*.

He has taught and directed at RADA, Rose Bruford, Italia Conti and Drama Studio London; his subjects include Mask, Bouffon, Clown, Mime and Acting. With David Glass and Korina Kokkali, he is developing an international training programme in devising theatre and creative practice called *Alchemy of the Extraordinary*.

Korina Kokkali Co-creator

Korina is a performer, choreographer, movement director and dance teacher.

Korina graduated in 2018 from MA: Movement Directing and Teaching at the Royal Central School of Speech & Drama with a scholarship from the Onassis Foundation. She has a BA in Theatre Studies at National & Kapodistrian University of Athens (2014) and she has trained as a dancer and dance teacher at the Higher Professional Dance School Niki Kontaxaki graduating with a Distinction (2010).

Since 2014, Korina has worked in several productions in Greece and the UK. In Athens she movement directed and choreographed the opera *Hedda Gabler* (Greek National Opera), *Karagatsis Kotzambasis & Dimitriadis Therismos* (Greek National Theatre, D. Tarlow) and Sophocle's *Antigone* (Athens & Epidaurus Theatre Festival, VAST programme, A. Raptotasios) and more. In London has worked with David Glass (Galapagos, Jackson's Lane, *The Brides* London International Mime Festival 2023 and Teatro dei Rinnovati Siena), as a performer in the R&D "Weimer repertoire" with Simon McBurney (2019, Complicité) and with Simona Gonella (2018, MA Lab Devising Workshop at RADA).

Together with Simon Gleave she is the co-artistic director of <u>JEUDi</u>, a dance-theatre performance company based between Greece and the UK with a focus on play and creative practices in care contexts.

Matt Leventhall Lighting Designer

MA Theatre Lab

Welcome to this year's Summer Public Performances from RADA's MA Theatre Lab.

MA Theatre Lab is a unique programme, offering emergent theatre artists advanced performance training in the context of collaborating on making original theatre and performance.

For these Public Performances, the cohort has split into two groups, each working intensively with innovative 'makers' on creating a new piece of work. This year the students are fortunate to be collaborating with Simon Gleave and Korina Kokkali and emma + pj.

Both woOd and Welcome to Noware have been devised by the two ensembles over five intensive weeks of work with their directors. What you'll experience are 'works in development' - versions 1.0 of new performances, not finished or polished pieces.

The emphasis over the rehearsal period has been generation and an initial work on composition. If we had another two weeks, I'm sure the pieces would look quite different to what they are now.

Which does not de-value what you'll see today, of course. Original theatre making is (hopefully) a constantly evolving process. The students will continue rehearsing during their run, modelling an approach that is responsive to what happens night after night. The shows can and should develop through their experience with you; so, what you see today maybe slightly different tomorrow.

On the surface our companies have had completely different processes, resulting in beautifully different pieces of work. For me, however, both explore important contemporary themes within specific aesthetic frameworks. They develop the performers experience of making work in different registers, with those already 'doing it' professionally in the field.

This invaluable learning will underpin the students' making as they head into their final term, when they'll be creating their own original work for our end of year Lab Works Festival in late November.

We're very grateful to you for joining us for today's performance. I sincerely hope that you will enjoy the work and connect to the spirit of experimentation from which the shows have emerged.
